## From the President's Desk...

Reflections on the summer...

I am sitting at my desk looking out through the trees at the at mist rising off North bay as the sun rises on to the peninsula. A sumac on my hillside is already red and the crisp air underscores the end of the summer. What a privilege to experience a quiet Sunday morning like this.

I am amazed at how seriously some individuals take their stewardship responsibilities toward the lake. I suppose it is a natural grateful response to their good fortune of what the lake has given to them. Quietly those people contribute thousands of hours of their time to being good stewards.

I was also struck by the results of a survey of over 1,100 Pine River Watershed property owners which overwhelmingly found that water quality and responsible land-use were the most important issues to our friends and neighbors. A similar study survey in Crooked Lake Township yielded almost identical results. There is a relatively silent majority when it comes to protecting our lakes and waters—or at least that is what the numbers say.

On the Association we continue to work on protection. For example, we will begin much more vigorous boat monitoring to prevent invasive exotic species, we continue to test water four times a year at four different locations. We closely monitor fishery data and work with the DNR to manage the fishery. We should do more, and certainly we could with help from those who want to give back a little. Anyone who wants to help let us know! We have volunteer opportunities ranging from working on the board to boat monitoring for 2 hours.

### New Outdoor Warning Siren for Washburn Lake

At the June General Meeting, Jamie Prax and Sarah Fairbanks invited the Lake Washburn Association (LWA) to help support the purchase and installation of outdoor warning sirens for the Washburn Lake and Outing areas. LWA MEMBERS RALLIED TO THE CAUSE! By the end of August, 77 families who live or vacation on Lake Washburn had donated a total of \$3,255. LWA "matched" members' donations and contributed \$6,510 to the siren fund in September.

At the time this article was written, the installation on the new outdoor warning system was planned to begin in late September. The siren on Washburn Lake will be located on Peninsula Road, approximately 0.7 miles north of county road 48.

#### 2006 Lake Vegetation Survey

In July of 2006, the DNR Ecological Services
Division completed a survey and study of the
aquatic vegetation in our lake. The survey was
rather extensive and the resulting report presents a
number of observations and conclusions concerning
our lake.

In brief, the lake was sampled on a grid basis with a total of 819 sample sites. Samples were taken at depths ranging from the shore line out to depths of 24 feet, However, vegetation was most commonly found from shore out to a 15 foot depth. 82% of the sample sites contained plants. Common submerged plants included bushy pondweed, flat stem pondweed, muskgrass, wild celery and coontail. The east basin contained a higher number of vegetated areas. The west and north basin often contained a higher number of individual species per site.

The good news coming from the survey is that

at that time there was no evidence of our lake containing any non native invasive species such as Eurasian Milfoil or Curley-leaf Pondweed.

In hopes of keeping our lake free of invasive plants and mussels, we remind our members to talk to their guests that bring a boat or jet ski to our lake and ask that they inspect their boats and trailers BEFORE launching their boats into the lake. This should also include the draining of live wells and sumps.

### Sustainability Committee Report

Currently the sustainability is working with several property owners around the lake to help them achieve their objectives for their land, and the lake.

We have identified approximately 10 projects which have over three miles of shoreline, and over 300 acres of land.

The goal when we work with a property owner is to help them achieve their objectives, which means looking at their tax situation, long-term desires for their land, and their plans for future generations (including estate tax considerations).

However, the committee's role will be as a facilitator or resource. We are partnering with the DNR, the Leech Lake Area Watershed Foundation (LLAWF), and other organizations.



#### Washburn Lake 2007 Boat Monitoring Summary By Bob Holman

Another year of boat monitoring has past.

Boats were checked on 3 occasions: Opening
Fishing, Memorial Day and Fourth of July - 3 days
each. The total number of boats checked is as
follows:

Fishing opener - 37 total: 24 from Washburn; 11 from other lakes; and 2 new.

Memorial Day - 42 total: 33 from Washburn;

8 from other lakes; and 1 new.

Fourth of July - 34 total: 16 from Washburn;

18 from other lakes.

At the LWA General meeting in August, a question was asked about the percentage of boats checked that came from other lakes. For the 3 weekends, 33% were from other lakes. Lake Minnetonka and White Bear Lake were two lakes that have Eurasian Milfoil.

An updated list of lakes containing these exotic species will be obtained from the DNR this fall. From this list, a report will be generated to summarize the 2006 and 2007 boat monitoring efforts and identify those outside lakes that contain milfoil and/or zebra mussels. This list will also be provided to the boat monitoring volunteers to emphasize the importance of taking extra precautions for boats coming from these lakes during 2008 boat monitoring.



# Reasons why sooner rather than later is good for Conservation Easements and Land Donations

There are several reasons why anyone considering a conservation easement should react sooner rather than later.

- Through December 31, 2007 conservation easements will be deductible up to 50% of a taxpayer's adjusted gross income, and a tax payer can continue take a 50% deduction until the value of the donation is used (up to 15 years). After December 31, 2007 percentage will be reduced to 30%.
- Cass County has funds available which can be used for all the costs associated with a conservation easement or land donation. These costs include appraisal costs, legal costs, and closing costs. These funds are limited and will be used on a first come first served basis!
- Easements donated can be used to generate grant funds (Reinvest in Minnesota, RIM) which can be used for other conservation projects. In some cases the families, and individuals holding these parcels will need to take action soon, in many cases they have expressed interest in bargain sales if the land is preserved.
- Estate Tax law is set to change back...in 2011. The exemption on estate tax has been increasing, and the estate tax will be eliminated in 2010—but if no further tax legislation is passed it will return to \$1 million exemption in 2011. That means that larger estates will be taxed at a rate of 55% on its assets in excess of \$1 million. Because a conservation easement reduces the value of your property that would reduce the amount of your estate subject to estate tax, and reducing the risk of needing to sell the cabin to settle the estate tax.

If you want to have a say in how your land is used after your death an easement and other provisions in your will could avoid conflict among relatives, and proactively dealing with the questions helps.

#### 2007 Loon Report

Six adopted loon platforms were put out in early spring of 2007. Three of these platforms produced two chicks each for total of six chicks. Those platforms were the Cartwright and Nelles platforms in east lake and the Sue Estvold platform in west lake. A natural nest on Loon Island (southern most island) east lake produced two chicks. Two other known natural nests didn't produce because of predation to the eggs.

In the early morning hours in July two coordinated boat counts of loons were made by John Ulrich and Richard Nelles. One boat started in south end of east lake and one south end of west lake with the boats then meeting in the west narrows. On 7-19-07, 30 adults and seven chicks were counted. On 7-20-07, 33 adults and seven chicks were counted.

Something of interest, of what we have been experiencing the past years, appeared in the June Journal of Wildlife Management by the Wildlife Society. Volume 71, Number 4, June 2007. Article name: Reproductive Advantages for Common Loons using Rafts. This research was done in Maine and New Hampshire



## Exotic Invasive Species Program Approved by General Membership

At the August General meeting the membership unanimously approved an Exotic Invasive Specie Prevention Plan, the most substantial part of which was an increase in monitoring boats as they enter and leave Washburn.

Historically we have had people from the Association perform inspections at the boat landing on major weekends. While we plan to continue that program, we determined that more action was needed. The Department of Natural Resources will supply trained interns to perform inspections at the public landing on an expanded schedule.

We have already initiated conversations with other area Associations (Thunder and RALALA) to increase signage, and coordinate our plans with theirs.

Additionally the other parts of the plan include: increased training for volunteers and citizens, and this will be scheduled early next year, and allowing LWA members to create a fund to take care of annual program costs as well as building reserves to react quickly when an exotic species is located, and hopefully reduce or eliminate the problem before it takes over.

At the meeting we looked at the prevention costs compared to the costs of controlling an infestation like milfoil, and the consensus was the prevention dollars are well spent. As an example, Bay Lake (2390 acres), which has had Eurasian Milfoil for 20 years spends around \$140,000 per year on the invasive species problem—all of that is financed from the property owners!

This plan will be reassessed next year looking closely at the data and experience from the first year.



#### Washburn infected with Purple Loosestrife

Just before labor day when two LWA volunteers were out doing water testing, they noticed purple loosestrife on the northeast side of Eastlake. It is well established on about a hundred yards of shoreline. The DNR has confirmed that it is purple loosestrife, and instructed members of the association on a plan of action.

On Saturday, September 8, a group of LWA volunteers removed the seed heads from the plants, and treated individual plants with a herbicide. The DNR has told us that the plant is likely to return and we will need to repeat this for around 10 years!

Purple loosestrife was imported from the Europe and Asia for use in gardens in the early 1800s. It is a beautiful plant, but it eventually crowds out native species, and is of little use to local wild life (since they are also not from Eurasia!)

Please go to the DNR website for more information on Purple Loosestrife, and keep an eye out on your property. Here is some information from the DNR website to help identify Purple Loosestrife: 

- Flower: Individual flowers have five or six pink-purple petals surrounding small, yellow centers. Each flower spike is made up of many individual flowers.
- Leaves: Leaves are downy, with smooth edges. They are
  usually arranged opposite each other in pairs which alternate
  down the stalk at 90 degree angles, however, they may appear
  in groups of three.
- Stalks: Stalks are square, five or six-sided, woody, as tall as 6 feet with several stalks on mature plants.

If you think you have Purple loose strife <u>DO NOT</u>

<u>REMOVE IT</u>. Call Ted Johnson at 218-792-5958 or
612-619- 6533 and we will come by to take a look. <u>Simply</u>
<u>pulling the plants could actually worsen the infestation!</u>
